**PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE:
CONSENT AND AGENCY: THE SEXIEST PART OF ROMANCE
BY LAQUETTE**

In a genre that's written mostly for and by women, it's always surprised me how infrequent heroines are depicted as having sexual agency. Essentially, sex often happens because the hero initiates and drives it. The heroine only responds to that desire. In my opinion, there is nothing sexier than a woman who knows what she wants in life and in bed.

I have never subscribed to the idea that women don't need or desire sex as much as men do. Because of this belief, my heroines always embrace their sexuality, no matter what level of sexual experience they possess. My ladies don't just say yes in response to the heroes' desires. They are making their own desires known and participating in a collaborative effort to have their needs met in conjunction with the heroes'. They are engaging in sex because they want it. They are initiating sex because they are comfortable with their sexuality and have no fear in expressing their needs.

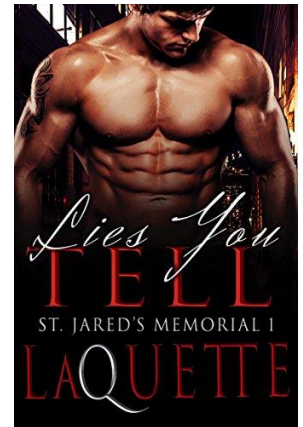
Today's woman does not need an excuse to want, seek, or engage in sex. We need to stop writing her as if she does. Women are commanding everything from boardrooms to military units. Why can't we have sex, ask for sex, and ask for it the way we want it without first putting a qualifier before that decision to engage? We are autonomous beings, we have the right to embrace our sexuality.

Another aspect of the heroine's autonomy is consent. A woman who is allowed to say no without concerning herself with explaining her choice, and having that choice be accepted and respected by the hero is powerful. It keys into the idea that a woman is capable and has the right to decide what happens to her body. So, when a heroine says yes, it's because she's making the explicit choice to share her body with someone. She is exerting her power and authority. And just in case you weren't aware, power is sexy.

That's how I keep my books sexy. Displaying that sort of authority and confidence makes for a more dynamic heroine. It also makes the interaction between the hero and heroine more interesting too. If you add in a hero who is aroused by that kind of healthy, consensual, outlook on sex, you've just given me everything I want as a reader. Let your ladies choose their particular brand of sexy. Trust me, that's how you keep things hot.

Keep it sexy! 💋

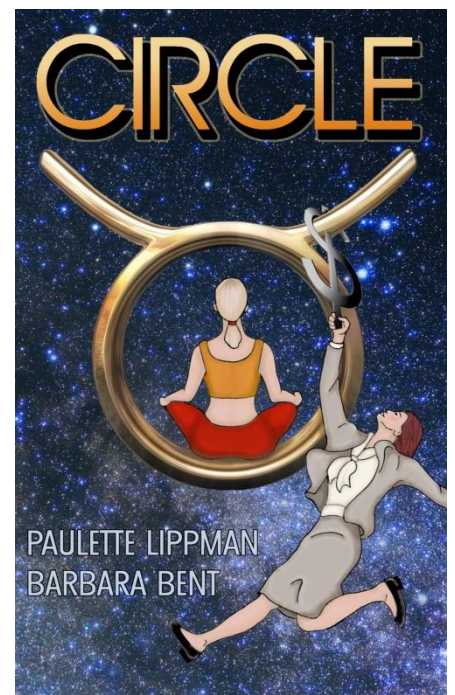
"That's awful."

SEX SELLS!**BY MARIA FERRER**

Sex Sells! Which is great because that's our bread and butter.

And, whether you shut the bedroom door or invite the reader to join you in bed, it's all about sex. Sex is not just the coupling, it's a dance, it's romance. It's that first look, that seductive smile, that extra swing in the hips, that abs flex, that first kiss, that hot embrace, that sexual spark, that heated touch, that joining of two bodies (maybe three!).

It's up to the individual author how much heat she / he wants to add to the story. I like my stories hot and on the erotic side because I want to be there for every moment of the romance. I was a reader before I was a writer. I was – and am – still every heroine, so I want to be immersed in the whole story – every conflict, every victory, every kiss.

How to add heat to your story in five easy steps:

1. Open the bedroom door. Let the reader in and on the bed.
2. Got spark? Whether your protagonists are partners or antagonists, readers need to see and feel the spark between them to make the romance real.
3. Girl gets boy, girl loses boy, girl gets his best friend. No, girl gets boy. Maybe, girl gets both. Writers must make the heroine and hero work for their HEA. The more conflict, the more action, the better the makeup sex.
4. Sensual and satisfying. Open the bedroom door; it bears repeating. The reader wants to share in that climax.
5. Sex Sells. Keep the reader wanting more and they'll buy your next book.

If you want to keep the door closed or only partially opened, that's fine too. Sweet Romances sell just as well. Write what you are comfortable with, at the level of hotness you prefer. After all, you are the heroine / hero of your own story. Make it a good one, and remember that love is love. ♥

**ABOUT PAN
(PUBLISHED AUTHOR NETWORK)**



The purpose of the Published Authors Network (PAN) is to establish within the RWA framework a network of communication and support to effectively promote and protect the interests of published romance authors; to open channels of communication between those romance authors and other publishing industry professionals; and to encourage professionalism on all levels and in all relationships within the publishing industry.

To be eligible for General PAN Membership: RWA General or Honorary members in good standing should have earned at least \$1,000 on a single novel or novella that meets the definition of Romance Fiction.

To be eligible for Provisional PAN Membership: RWA General or Honorary members in good standing should have: (1) contracted for the publication of a novel or novella for an advance of at least \$1,000, but said work is not yet commercially available ("Option One"); or (2) published a novel or novella, but not yet earned \$1,000 ("Option Two"). Works offered through Predatory Publishing companies shall not qualify.♥

About PRO



The purpose of the PRO Community of Practice is to establish within RWA a network of communication and support to effectively promote and protect the interests of romance writers in the areas between manuscript completion and PAN eligibility.

To help members reach the next level, PRO focuses on the business side of writing rather than craft. This program is available to any active General or Honorary member who: (1) is not PAN-eligible and (2) has one complete original work of romance fiction of at least 20,000 words, or multiple complete original works of romance fiction which combine for a total of at least 20,000 words.♥
