LaQuette signed contract with DreamSpinner and is teaching at RT's BootCamp.


Kate McMurray signed a two-book contract with Carina.

Michael Molloy is working on a third romance; hopes to be done by Spring.


Harper Miller's goal for 2018 is to get an agent, and to finish two novels. She's already plotted out four books of a new series.

Jennifer Welsh got an agent and a contract with Carina!♥




FREE ME by Kay Blake



CRUSHING ON THE MILLIONAIRE by Anna DePalo




BOOK COVERS AND THE INDIE AUTHOR BY BARBARA JAMES



Being an indie author appeals to me greatly because I value the independence of it, and especially when criticism persists about the serious flaws within the publishing industry.


I enjoy challenging myself to learn new skills and grow. I like the process of writing and working with developmental editors, copy editors and proofreaders to make my work the best it can be. Finally, I enjoy the fun of choosing cover art and hiring graphics artists to make the covers for the books. There are plenty of freelancers who do great work.

Writer control over cover art matters, because I have heard stories about authors filling out publishing company questionnaires explaining exactly what the cover art should look like, but feeling let down when the art department presented them with an image that didn't match the book.



So, this month, my second book is coming out, GOING HOME: ROGER. My Sweet Romance Authors Facebook group hosted a Christmas party last December and it was a great opportunity to get feedback. I showed two different images of models and asked them which they preferred.

Making Roger's book available for sale six months after STARTING OVER: RICK came out on August 5, 2017, presented me with an opportunity to reflect on theme. Perhaps I should change Rick's cover? His cover reflected a certain image, that he was a man who had faced challenges in life, but that he was ready to start over in different ways. Yet, Rick and Roger were good friends on similar life trajectories and experiencing similar themes. Should their covers match, too?



It occurred to me that they should, since they are part of the same series. Once again, the fun part of the process involved polling members of my different writing groups on Facebook and Twitter, showing them the original cover and the second cover I had in mind. The polls indicated that the second/ new cover was the more popular one. Rick's first cover was good for a specific moment in time, but he was growing and developing, and so his cover demonstrated that growth. Changing the cover was a simple matter of sending the graphic artist the new image and waiting to see what she came up with.



* Exchange gifts – who doesn't want gifts?


*Consume fizzy drinks - ok, so I'm partial to Merlot, but even I'll

effectively promote and protect the interests of published romance authors; to open channels of communication between those romance authors and other publishing industry professionals; and to encourage professionalism on all levels and in all relationships within the publishing industry.

To be eligible for General PAN Membership: RWA General or Honorary members in good standing should have earned at least \$1,000 on a single novel or novella that meets the definition of Romance Fiction.

To be eligible for Provisional PAN Membership: RWA General or Honorary members in good standing should have: (1) contracted for the publication of a novel or novella for an advance of at least \$1,000, but said work is not yet commercially available ("Option One"); or (2) published a novel or novella, but not yet earned \$1,000 ("Option Two"). Works offered through Predatory Publishing companies shall not qualify.♥

About PRO

The purpose of the PRO Community of Practice is to establish within RWA a network of communication and support to effectively promote and protect the interests of romance writers in the areas between manuscript completion and PAN eligibility.

To help members reach the next level, PRO focuses on the business side of writing rather than craft. This program is available to any active General or Honorary member who: (1) is not PAN-eligible and (2) has one complete original work of romance fiction of at least 20,000 words, or multiple complete original works of romance fiction which combine for a total of at least 20,000 words.♥
